R: Once I prayer, "Lord, have mercy on me; heal me, I have sinned against You."



If the man is leprous and unclean, the priest shall declare him unclean by reason of the sore on his head.

LV 13:1-2, 44-46

"The one who bears the sore of leprosy shall keep his garments rent and his head bare, and shall muffle his beard; he shall cry out, 'Unclean, unclean!' As long as the sore is on him he shall declare himself unclean, since he is in fact unclean. He shall dwell apart, making his abode outside the camp."

GOSPEL

MK 1:40-45

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Mark.

Glory be to You, Lord.

A leper came to Jesus and kneeling down begged him and said, "If you wish, you can make me clean." Moved with pity, he stretched out his hand, touched him, and said to him, "I do will it. Be made clean." The leprosy left him immediately, and he was made clean. Then, warning him sternly, he dismissed him at once.

He said to him, "See that you tell no one anything, but go, show yourself to the priest and offer for your cleansing what Moses prescribed; that will be proof for them." The man went away and began to publicize the whole matter. He spread the report abroad so that it was impossible for Jesus to enter a town openly. He remained outside in deserted places, and people kept coming to him from everywhere.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise be to You, Lord Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Jesus encounters a "leper" in today's Gospel. The "leper" is willing to step out in faith and approach Jesus (Who is surrounded by a crowd of people). Thus the man with a skin condition (which has ostracized the individual from the community) enters into the realm of the "clean." The leper calls out for healing. He wants not only a physical change in his body, but also a change in his status as an outsider to the community. He is willing to submit to the will of Jesus as he loudly proclaims, "If You will. . ." Jesus is once again filled with compassion. He sense the suffering (both physical and social) which the man has endured and is enduring. Jesus wants the man's salus (wholeness, healing, salvation). Jesus heals the man and sends him to fulfill the prescriptions of the Jewish law – presenting himself to the priests to be declared "whole" and "clean." Although the man is instructed not to tell others of his healing, he cannot restrain from announcing what has happened. This leads to further problems for Jesus, since the crowds even more fervently seek out Jesus so that they can experience the power of His healing and miracles.

As I reflect on the readings I realize the importance of wholeness and healing (salus). I see a relationship between physical, spiritual, emotional, and social illness. I am not falling into the mistake of saying that one causes the other (as some people who say that sin causes physical illness). I am saying that I see a correlation and interconnection between the different kinds of unwholeness and un-holiness that individuals experience.
